2018 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Literary & Visual Arts Contest

The Man Behind the Dream

Most of us know about Dr. Martin Luther King's dream, but how much do we know about the man behind the dream? This year's Literary and Visual Arts Contest is an opportunity to explore Dr. King's roots and life to make connections with Dr. King to your own life.

Each grade level group is being given a different time in Dr. King's life to examine and to connect to the student's own life and experiences. Using your grade level's prompt, describe in writing or through visual art how you can relate Dr. King's life to your own life.

K-2: On January 15, 1929, a baby boy was born to a young Baptist pastor and his school teacher wife. This child was special from the beginning. Martin loved people and he loved learning.

How do you show your love for people in your life (friends, family members and other people you know) and for the things you enjoy learning? OR what do your friends and family members do that show that they love you?

3-5: The King family members were active in the civil rights movement and they were not afraid to take a stand for what they believed was right. Martin's parents taught him to follow his conscience and to fight for what he believed in.

How have the people in your life inspired you to take a stand and to fight for what you believe in?

6-8: In 1955, Rosa Parks, a seamstress in Montgomery, Alabama, challenged the segregation law by refusing to give up her seat on the bus to a white man. Inspired by her actions, a group of citizens banded together to protest and challenge the law and elected 26-year-old Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. as their spokesman. Thus, the Montgomery Bus Boycott began and it propelled Dr. King into the national spotlight as spokesman for the civil rights movement.

Have you ever challenged the 'status quo' in your community or school? What law or rule do you think is not just, and what steps have you taken or would you like to take to try to change that law or rule?

9-12: Dr. King became known across the country for his oratory skills and his commitment to the philosophy of non-violent resistance. Rooted in the teachings of Mahātmā Ghandi, King was committed to achieving social change through non-violent methods. Some of his methods included marches, sit-ins and other types of peaceful protests.

What peaceful protests have you seen or participated in? Why do you think peaceful protests are more effective than violent ones? How could you use non-violent resistance to change something in the world today?

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CATEGORIES & RULES

WRITING

- Elementary (K-5) contest entries must be a minimum of 25 words but not more than 150 words.
- Middle School (6-8) entries must be a minimum of 150 words but not more than 250 words.
- High School (9-12) entries must be a minimum of 250 words but not more than 350 words.
- All entries **must** be typed or printed on an $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11^{\circ}$ white piece of paper.
- Do not put your name on the essay; instead attach your essay to this form and email it to *mlkentries@apsva.us* or deliver it to any of the locations listed below.

POETRY

- Poems must be your original unpublished work.
- All entries **must** be typed or printed on an $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11^{\circ}$ white piece of paper.
- Do not put your name on the poem, instead attach your poem to this form and email it to mlkentries@apsva.us or deliver it to one of the locations listed below

VISUAL

- Artwork can be produced in any medium and can be 2D or 3D
- Do not put your name on the art, instead attach this form to your artwork and deliver it to one of the locations listed below.
